Maureen White on 07889 654906 has kindly agreed to provide transport for those who need help getting to The Old Forge.

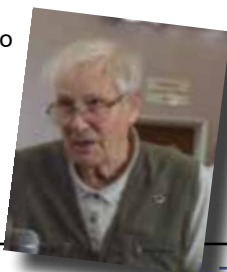

So all of the guests on the trip got an extra



complimentary glass of Prosecco with their fish and chips, and Eleanor was presented with her own bottle of bubbly in celebration of this event.

Eleanor's second trip on Electra, the first being a cream tea cruise from Fenny Stratford to Stoke Hammond. When asked about what it was that attracted her to the cruises, she said 'because there's no noise from the engine, it forces you to just slow down and enjoy looking at the canal. You realise how lovely and quiet it is, it's really relaxing'. She added 'The wildlife isn't so worried either, because you haven't got all that noise, so they don't hear you coming; it just feels really peaceful'. Eleanor is also keen to come on one of our later trips, particularly the seasonal 'Mulled Wine and Mince Pie' cruise, which I confirmed we would be running again this year.

New cruises planned for 2026

A new charity, MK Canals, (mkcanals.org) is organising the installation of a new electric bollard and accessible boarding point, at the canal side in Wolverton. This will give us the opportunity next year to run trips from Wolverton, North (to the Galleon and Cosgrove) and then South (to New Bradwell and Great Linford). HAVERSHAM SOCIAL AND COMMUNITY CENTRE (HSCC) USEFUL INFORMATION



About the HSCC

The Haversham Social and Community Centre (HSCC) charity was established to maintain and operate the Social and Community Centre, under licence from Milton Keynes City Council, for the benefit of Parish residents.

You can hire the hall for your events, activities, classes and parties.

To help fund the Social and Community Centre, the HSCC also runs a number of community events each year.

Booking the Social and Community Centre

The Small Hall (approx. 37m²) is available between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. weekdays during term time only. The Entire Hall (approx. 150m²) is available 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. weekdays during term time and 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. at all other times.

Minimum hire period is 1½ hours. Kitchen facilities are available at no charge for light refreshments. There is a charge of £25 per session for full catering use with access to the cooker.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

– the view from the Chair

I write this as the weather turns more autumnal and the nights are drawing in. Another busy couple of months for the Parish Council although very rewarding, and, as usual, there are a number of matters to update you all on.

Before that, I just want to note the recent passing of Christopher Vaughan. Christopher lived in Haversham for over 50 years, initially at the Old Rectory and latterly at Conker Cottage. His time on the Parish Council spanned three decades from the late 80s including many years as the Chair. I understand that often his daughters had to be encouraged (under duress!) to deliver the Parish Magazine to the village!



He was also able to offer free legal advice to the Parish Council on a variety of matters, such as gaining compensation from the local utilities company when they wanted to move services, which went into the parish funds. He also supported other local groups with his advice and guidance on many legal matters.

Whilst I did not know Chris well, whenever our paths crossed in the village, we would have a chat, often about Rugby (although as many of you know that, unlike Chris, I am not a Saints fan having grown up elsewhere in the country!) but always warm and friendly.

He will be sadly missed by his wife Deborah, daughters Maddie and Miranda and grandchildren Ellie and Benny Roberts as well as his many friends within Haversham and elsewhere.

Playground Update and other work on the Rec

We were immensely proud and a bit relieved to open the new Playground on 1st August. It was wonderful to see so many of you there, despite the slightly inclement weather, and the absolute joy on the faces of so many children as they tried out the new equipment for the first time. There is a separate article elsewhere in the magazine about the journey to that day, but I want to express my heartfelt thanks to Maria, our now former clerk, for all her hard work over the last three years to get this project delivered. It was only right that on the day Maria cut the ribbon to open the play area, although I only gave her about one minute's notice as she and her family were walking up the path just after I had started the opening proceedings!

Alongside the new play area, we have taken the opportunity to relocate and refurbish the benches that used to be in a straight line along the fence. We also received two new benches from the playground supplier HAGS, for which we are grateful. As I write this, one bench remains 'work-in-progress', but



thanks to Ian Burgess (and Gill) for their work to bring those benches back to life for us. I have seen all the benches, new and old, are being well used now they are more spread out in the play area.

We have also completed the long-awaited refurbishment of the Skate ramp which I understand 'is skating well'. Thanks to



Rob of Raddi Ramps for doing such a great job and to the skating

community for their contribution to the cost, as well as their repainting of the frame. Despite the refurbishment, the ramp will still wear with use and produce splinters, so please parents, do discourage children from using it as a slide. We also now have a clear maintenance regime in place between the skating community and ourselves to keep the ramp in as good a condition as possible in the coming years.

We have now turned our attention to the path from Manor Drive. We have 50% of the funds via the MKCC Community Infrastructure Fund grant and will be progressing this in the coming months. We are not sure of the exact timescale given the work needed to appoint a contractor, but we will keep you informed of progress and, of course, when the work happens that entrance will be closed for a period.

Longer term there are other refurbishment ideas on the table, but these are dependent both on funds and the capacity of the Parish Council to get them done.

Councillor Vacancies

We remain at four parish councillors, so three less than our statutorily allowed

complement of seven. As noted in my last report, that increases the risk that we will not be quorate at our meetings and, indeed, due to illness and a personal situation, that happened at our meeting on 15 September. We were forced to cancel the meeting and inevitably that means that some important items remain unresolved.

We urgently need to bolster councillor numbers and increase representation from across the Parish. Outside of the monthly meetings, this voluntary role is very flexible and you can decide how much time and effort you wish to put in. We all find it very rewarding and you can all see the difference we have been able to make on a number of areas across the Parish.

Community Allotment Plot

As a follow-on from the successful Allotment Open Day, a group of residents approached the Parish Council with the idea of a Community Plot to allow people who maybe cannot take on a whole allotment plot, to have a small area to work personally, plus to provide a shared area that can be tended by a group. This was to be discussed at our cancelled meeting on 15 September, so at this stage no decision has been taken, but if anyone is interested in this project, please contact the Clerk and we will pass on your details to the community plot team.

Wolverton Household Waste Recycling Centre

Little news other than to say that by the time you read this, the first meeting of the Community Liaison Group will have taken place. A number of residents have signed up to this group including myself, and

once we have news to share we will do so through the usual channels.

We still have no indication of when MKCC will submit their formal planning application, but that may become clearer at the upcoming meeting.

Highways and Road Safety

Little news here as well – partly due to the usual summer slowdown and also due to the fact that many of the issues raised with MKCC have been resolved.

We continue to press for a resolution to the 'eScooter litter' on the Wolverton Road and are in discussions with MKCC and Lime to try and resolve this, as well as listen to what they have to say about extending the scheme into the new village – we welcome your views on a possible extension.

We also continue to engage with MKCC in regard to the flooding situations at Rowan Drive and Haversham Hill, as well as pushing for the various road safety and speed limit changes around the Parish to be progressed.

Just to remind you, if you see a maintenance issue locally, don't forget to use the 'Report It' page on the MKCC website, <https://www.milton-keynes.gov.uk/pay-report-and-apply/report-it>.

Planning Matters

A delegated decision to progress the MK City Plan 2050 local plan into its next six-week round of consultation (Regulation 19) is scheduled for 28 October. After this consultation, MKCC still intend to submit the plan for examination by the Planning Inspectorate in March 2026. The Parish Council will consider our response to the consultation at a future meeting.

No further news on the HcLL Neighbourhood Plan allocated development site in the old village, other than the developer is planning to undertake some landscaping work on the site shortly, which will also improve the

bridleway accessibility.

The long-awaited report of the New Towns Taskforce has not yet been published so we still do not know if their recommendation will include Milton Keynes. The report is expected in the coming weeks and the date now being quoted is 'by the end of the year'. We have no other information and thus no idea whether or not it will impact our Parish.

The Parish Council awarded two Community Long Service trophies: the first to Joan and Harold Lowndes for all that they have done for the community since they moved to Haversham in 1970. This included supporting the Church, the HSCC, the Jubilee Club and many other aspects of village life. It was a pleasure to meet Harold at the show as well as his daughter Karen.

The second was to Jackie Brown, who earlier in the year stood down as both Trustee and Chair of the HSCC. She had



been Chair for 19 years and a committee member/Trustee for much longer. She continues to be involved and helped the events team with the Village Show this year, but we hope she also now enjoys



not having the overall responsibility for the charity!

The final award was the Rose-Stimpson Cup for the 'Parish Resident of the Year' which was kindly donated by Ena and Gerald Stimpson when they moved away from the parish.

It was presented by their daughter Gill Callow to Lucille Smith (Mrs Smith to our younger readers) for her work on the Forest School at Haversham Village School. This was no small feat given all the aspects of design, fund-raising and delivery and I know that it is well loved by the children. Well done, Lucille!

Congratulations to them all and also everyone else who was successful at our wonderful show!

CCTV for the Rec: some of you may have noticed the CCTV camera by the school. This is there to keep an eye on the new play equipment on the recreation ground and is not monitoring the school at all.

Neighbourhood Watch: the new village schemes are all set-up and running and

Parking on the Crescent: it has been brought to our attention that there is an increasing level of parking on the 'Green' side of the road on The Crescent which is creating congestion as well as difficulties for people in getting their cars in and out of their driveways. Whilst parking is always a difficult topic, please do try and be considerate of your neighbours when you park.

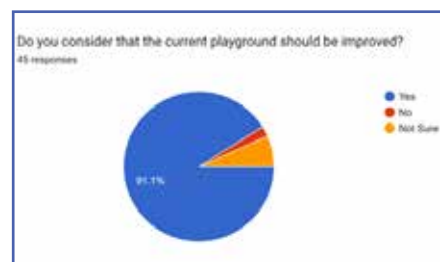

THE STORY OF THE HAVERSHAM PLAY AREA PROJECT

On 1st August 2025, we opened the rejuvenated play area at the end of what was almost three years of work to bring it to fruition. We and the other former and current members of the Parish Council are tremendously proud of the result, having successfully completed the largest single project ever delivered by the Parish Council. We have been truly touched by the positive reactions we have received since the opening, from adults and children alike, and on the various occasions we have been at the Rec, it has been wonderful to see the play area so well used. It has been a labour of love, sometimes tough, but always enjoyable and we wanted to share the story along with a number of pictures from the journey. Back in late 2022, our annual safety inspection noted that some of the older equipment was getting close to the end of its life and did not meet the current safety standards. The PC was reluctant to just remove old equipment so started to investigate how they could obtain funds to pay for new equipment. In May 2023 the project kicked off in earnest. One of the key things we needed to do to raise funds, was undertake community engagement. So, led by former Parish Councillor

Ceri Parkes-Brincat, we ran a number of surveys and face-to-face sessions, including an online survey, a stall at the Coronation Fete and some workshops with the children at Haversham Village School. We also started to contact potential suppliers. The survey work gave us a good idea



of what was needed and we briefed a number of suppliers in order to get quotes to support our grant applications. Another requirement for grants was some community funding. We set up a site for public donations and, with the support of Paul and the team at the Greyhound, ran a successful Pig Roast in August 2023. We now had some cash in the bank, but a long way short of the £100,000 we needed.

In the autumn of 2023, we began to apply for grant funding – a substantial job.



Unsurprisingly we had some rejections initially and had to evolve our applications, conduct some additional face-to-face surveys of residents and resubmit, but starting in January 2024 our first grant was confirmed from The

National Lottery Community Fund. In May 2024 a further grant followed from the Milton Keynes Community Foundation – specifically for sensory equipment – and then in September 2024 the final and largest grant was confirmed from The FCC Communities Foundation.

These three grants combined with the public funds and an amount from our own reserves meant we had reached our £100,000 target. Now we had to run a tender process to choose our supplier. We formed a playground working group that included the two of us and our newest Councillor, Jess Cuniffe, and ran a tender process over the latter part of 2024. As this was such a significant



tender it had to be run according to local government procurement rules, so another learning curve for us all! The tenders were evaluated in early 2025, and at the Parish Council meeting in February 2025 the working group presented its recommendation to the full Council. It was agreed that we would progress to contract with HAGS based on the design you will have seen many times over the last few months.

It was now time to finalise the details, agree the contract, wait for manufacture and then complete the install. In March we also ran a public exhibition at the Social Centre of our chosen design and allowed the children to make some of the final design decisions we needed to make – that was a wonderful afternoon seeing the reactions of the children (and parents!) as they came out of school that day.

The contract with HAGS was signed in April and manufacture began. Installation started on 8th June and throughout was a source of great excitement for the children as they saw the progress each day, noses pressed against the wire fence,



all with a growing sense of anticipation. We also posted messages, videos and pictures regularly on Facebook to keep the community updated with progress. Like all building work it was not without challenges! The digger certainly had to work hard to break through the rock and stone that was only a few inches under the surface, and keeping the new grass alive in the dry, hot weather was a trial. Due to the train being delayed (well, we are in Britain!), there was a slight break in the installation programme and a subsequent delay to our planned opening, but once all the new equipment had been installed and safety checked we were ready!

We opened the playground at 12:30pm on Friday 1st August. Despite being a grey day, it was wonderful to see so many of you there for the opening and thanks to the HSCC for allowing us to use their facility to offer refreshments and to the school for opening the gate to the Rec to allow people to go to and fro. One wonderful memory of that day was seeing the children waiting patiently for the

Community Foundation, without whom none of this would have happened. Further thanks to Jilly and the team at HAGS for her wonderful design; Luke at HAGS for managing the installation; and the HAGS installation team for working so hard in the very hot weather to get the build completed.

We all hope that the playground will continue to be a source of joy and pleasure for many years to come!

We would also like to express thanks for the support of Lloyd Andrews who recently repaired and serviced the curtains in the hall and to Paul Taylor who cleaned the windows, as well as provided a suitable ladder to help Lloyd do his repairs.

In the coming months we hope to progress our 'Social Centre Improvement' project where we plan to update the hall with things such as acoustic baffling, a hearing loop, Wi-Fi and Audio-Visual Equipment. More on that as it progresses, and if you have any expertise in any of these areas and can possibly help us out then do get in touch. One of the first tasks is raising funds and getting quotes for the work we have planned.

Village Show Update

We held another very successful show this year with a total of 46 entrants and 271 entries, which was down on the spectacular numbers at last year's 25th show but still excellent, particularly given the impact the weather had on the produce classes.

We were lucky with the weather on the day and had a great turnout of residents and non-residents who came to have a look at the entries, enjoy the refreshments and for many (young and old) the easy access to the new playground!

Thanks of course to the organising team, the entrants, the stewards, the judges, the church team led by Shula Holt on the refreshments, those who donated cakes, plus those who helped clear up afterwards. And of course, congratulations to those who won!

The major category prizes were awarded as follows:

The Photography award was won by **Hannah Cheetham-Joshi**. Despite the challenging growing season, **Gill Burgess** won both the Fruit and Vegetable trophies and **Graham Paley** won the Floral Cup for the second year running! The Domestic Cup was won by **Claire Clark**, the Arts & Crafts Cup by **Ian Burgess** and the Wood

& Metal award went to **Tim Spencer** – everyone was a worthy winner and for those that did not win, commiserations, but there were some great entries on display across every category so, as always, the competition was tough.

In the Children's section the Toddler (under-three) award was won by **Rowan Ridley**; for the three to under-seven group the award was won by **Noah Ridley**; the seven to under-ten award by **Zac Cheetham-Joshi** and the ten to under-fourteen by **Darcey Watkins**.

The Special awards were as follows:

The Bill Bedford Trophy for the best photograph entered by a child, as judged by Russell, our photography judge, went to **Kate Nagle-Smith**. The Pat Brightman award for the best exhibit by a child went to **Zac Cheetham-Joshi**. This award was judged by Pat Brightman's great-niece Amber, and it was lovely to see her at the show. For the first time this year we had an award for the best entry in the adult classes by someone under-18, and this went to **Kate Nagle-Smith** for her wonderful display of dried flowers and grasses. Kate received a medal that she is able to keep. Our judge, Irene, particularly pointed out how hard it was to get such a wonderful display of delicate dried flowers pulled together.

The Parish Council's Novice Award went to **Zac Cheetham-Joshi** for his imaginative 'pasta and pulse collage' and was judged by Richard Pryor, the Chair of the Parish Council. The HAGS trophy this year was for the best allotment grown entry and this was awarded to **Marc Watkins** for his impressive 'squash', although in the main 'heaviest marrow' class it was all slightly contentious in terms of whether it was a marrow – according to the vegetable

judge. We hope his success mitigated the disappointment of missing out in the heaviest marrow to **Benny Roberts**.

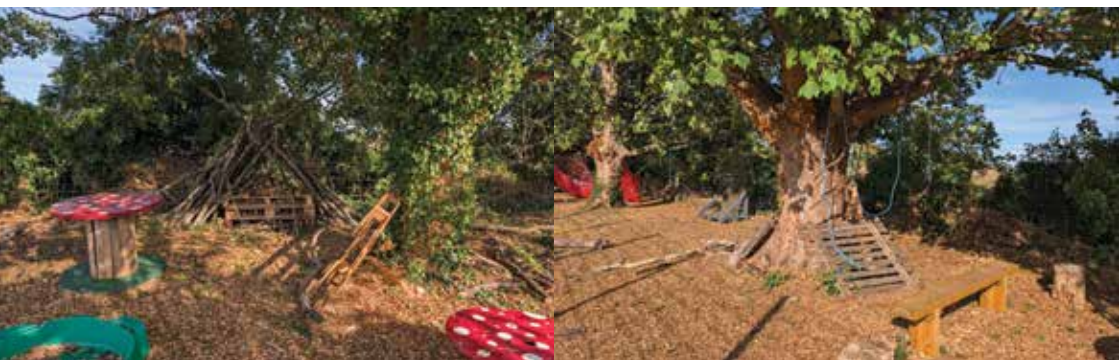

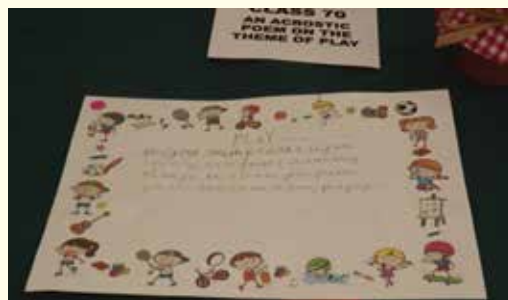

The story was of a baby, an only child, whom poor parents were willing to go to any lengths to protect. Some vicious political heavyweight had read in the stars that a child in one particular village would, in time, depose him, maybe even assassinate him. He daren't wait. He was determined to nip it in the bud. He forced the thugs in his organisation to rid that particular village of male children. Someone, thankfully, tipped off the village, and those who were quick enough to act, managed to escape.

When I heard the story, it reminded me of Moses. He was born a slave Jew in Egypt and had it not been for his mother setting him afloat on the water in a boat, then only to be found by a princess, he would have been part of the mass extermination of male Jew children. Why? Because Pharaoh was alarmed that the number of Jewish men slaves was growing too fast and they could threaten a bloody rebellion.

But back to our family. The parents (and others with children) left quickly – not just the village but also the country, for almost certainly they were followed. They aimed to return when the despot was dead or deposed, but no one knew how long that would take.

What would you do if your child or grandchild was threatened?

So they walked, carrying the child, for nearly five hundred miles, sleeping rough, crossing waterways, frequently hiding and relying on charity. Eventually they reach a country willing to have them. Many people must have helped them. And because of that, they survived.

Eventually the despot died, only to be replaced by his marginally less unpleasant son, but in the interim the family managed to return to their home country, this time choosing to live outside of the reach of the organisation.

Thankfully the refugees were welcomed. Even though it was only the child that was under threat, all three were allowed to remain until things were safe again.

The child was Jesus, the parents, Mary and Joseph, the tyrant Herod and the country of safety was, of all places, Egypt.

Forcing desperate people back home can be forcing them to abuse or death. Each one, loved by God, has a story, and, for my money, I am very glad that Jesus survived.
